### Events/Save the Date:

**Dr. Martha Sajatovic will present** “An update on a new treatment approach for homeless people with schizophrenia: Potential for improving health outcomes in our local community,” on **Thursday, February 14, 2013 from 9:00-11:00 AM at Trinity Commons, 2230 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio** (parking behind).

**Dr. Martha Sajatovic**, professor of psychiatry and director of the Neurological Outcomes Center at University Hospitals Case Medical Center, will address the results from a recent study of the effects of long-acting anti-psychotic medication in homeless schizophrenic patients.

The study, of 30 homeless men and women over six months, found that patients on the long-acting drug had significant reduction in homelessness, improvement in their social functioning, and in adherence to other medication regimens.

**Dr. Sajatovic** will present her findings at the International Congress of Schizophrenia Research in April. The study has also been accepted by *The Journal of Clinical Psychiatry*.





**Martha Sajatovic, MD**, Willard Brown Chair in Neurological Outcomes Research and Professor of Psychiatry and of Neurology at University Hospitals, recently published the third edition of her book, *Rating Scales in Mental Health* published by Johns Hopkins University Press, co-authored with **Luis Ramirez, MD**, on rating scales in mental health. The book builds upon **Dr. Sajatovic's** long-standing interest and expertise in neuropsychiatric health outcomes. ## Research:

University Hospitals is now conducting a research study of an investigational medication for Generalized Anxiety, Separation Anxiety, and Social Phobia. Participants must be between the ages of 6 and 17 years. Children with these disorders may have an excessive fear of being alone, refuse to go to school, avoid social situations or have difficulty sleeping. If eligible for this study, participants may receive mental health assessments, investigational medication and close follow up with a doctor who specializes in pediatric mental health at no cost. **The Discovery and Wellness Center for Children** at University Hospitals Case Medical Center is currently enrolling children ages 7-17 with Tourette's Disorder for a research study. Participants must be experiencing frequent motor and/or vocal tics that cause impairment in the child's normal routines. This study can be up to an 18 week period of involvement with only 8 weeks receiving investigational medication. ### ***SMI and Diabetes study***

Do you have any patients with **Serious Mental Illness** (i.e., Current MDE, Bipolar Disorder, or Schizophrenia/Schizoaffective Disorder) and **Type 2 Diabetes** (DM)? Could they benefit from learning more about how to manage their SMI and Diabetes?

Dr. Sajatovic's Research Team in collaboration with CWRU's Center for Healthcare Research and Policy (CHRP) at MetroHealth Medical Center is conducting a Randomized

Controlled Trial comparing a novel intervention (TTIM) intended to improve both SMI and DM self-management in 100 individuals with SMI-DM vs. 100 individuals with SMI-DM receiving treatment as usual (TAU).

Basic Inclusion/Exclusion Criteria includes:

Participants MUST:

- Have a diagnosis of schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder, bipolar disorder or depression;
- Have DM based upon either previous diagnosis or laboratory values; and
- Be  $\geq$  18 years of age;

Participants CANNOT:

- Have dementia; or
- Be pregnant.

Individuals will be randomized on a 1:1 basis to participate in either TTIM or TAU. Those randomized to TTIM will receive twelve weekly, group-format, in-person sessions (6-10 participants per group) delivered by a primary care Nurse Educator with experience and training in both DM and SMI treatment, and by a Peer Educator with SMI-DM. Over the 48 weeks following the TTIM sessions, the TTIM participants will receive periodic follow-up phone calls from the Peer Educator and in-person visits with the Nurse Educator to provide support by way of encouraging care engagement and healthy behaviors as well as addressing questions that may arise from a "consumer" perspective.

Primary and secondary outcome assessments will be repeated for both the TTIM and TAU participants at weeks 13, 30, and 60. Qualitative assessment for a subset of participants will be conducted at 13 weeks.

**Regardless of which group they are randomized to, all**

**participants will continue to receive their psychiatric and medical care from their usual providers throughout the study.**

### **OPT-BD Research Study**

Do you see any patients who are **60 years old or older** with **type I Bipolar Disorder** and are currently **sub-optimally responsive** to their prescribed BD treatments?

**To participate, individuals must:**

- 1.) Have Type I Bipolar Disorder
- 2.) Be age 60 or older
- 3.) Have sub-optimal response to current psychotropic management including:
  - a. Behaviors and symptoms of irritability, agitation, mood lability or diminished ability to interact with others in their place of residence
  - b. Diminished ability to take care of basic personal needs in their place of residence due to symptoms of BD

**To participate, individuals may NOT have:**

- 1.) History of intolerance or resistance to asenapine
- 2.) Clinical diagnosis of dementia or Mini-mental state (MMSE) < 24
- 3.) History of TIA, stroke or MI within the past 12 months
- 4.) Rapid cycling BD defined as 4 or more discrete mood episodes within the previous 12 months.

Participants will receive 12 weeks of open-label asenapine. Each study subject will serve as their own baseline control and mood symptoms will be assessed using standardized measures during the 12 weeks of asenapine therapy. The primary outcome is change from baseline in bipolar mood symptom scores (mania and depression).

Secondary outcomes include functional and general health status, global psychopathology, side effects, and extrapyramidal symptoms.
